## MINUTES OF MEETING ARIZONA STATE BOARD OF TECHNICAL REGISTRATION

JUNE 6, 1980

The regular quarter-annual meeting of the State Board of Technical Registration was held in the Occupational Licensing Building, Room 126, in Phoenix, Arizona on Friday, June 6, 1980. The meeting was called to order by Chairman Rod J. Gomez at 9:15 A.M.

#### 1. READING OF MINUTES

MOTION: It was moved by Mr. Trimble and seconded by Mr. Earley that the minutes of the regular meeting of the board held March 7, 1980 be approved as presented. Motion carried.

#### 2. REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Minutes of the Executive Session held May 15, 1980 are shown as Minute Pages 4463 - 4465.

MOTION: It was moved by Mr. Earley and seconded by Mr. Gookin that an emergency rule be adopted, subject to certification by the Attorney General, to require that a quorum of five board members be present at a board meeting in order to transact business.

AMENDMENT TO THE MOTION: It was moved by Mr. Goodwin and seconded by Mr. Nunn that the motion be amended to require that the quorum must include at least one architect and one engineer. Motion carried with four ayes, three nayes.

AMENDMENT TO MOTION: It was moved by Dr. O'Bannon and seconded by Mr. Gookin that the motion be amended to require a majority of the existing board members for a quorum. Motion passed.

Original motion, as amended, passed by majority vote.

#### 3. REPORT OF THE RULES AND BY-LAWS COMMITTEE

#### A. Exemplary Qualification

Dr. O'Bannon reported that he is making a study and will prepare a report, but is waiting for input from the professional societies and the other board members.

 $\overline{\text{MOTION}}$ : It was moved by Mr. Goodwin and seconded by Mr. Riggs that  $\overline{\text{Rule R4-30-30}}$  be adopted, subject to certification by the Attorney General, and that the Executive Director be authorized to sign the adoption for the board. Motion passed. Rule shown on Minute Page 4466.

#### 4. REPORT OF THE LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE

#### A. Commentary on Sunset Review

The Executive Director prepared a commentary on the revisions to the Technical Registration Act (shown on Minute Pages 4467-4472).

MOTION: It was moved by Mr. Gookin and seconded by Mr. Goodwin that this commentary be adopted and printed for mailing to the Governor, members of the Legislature and all registrants. Motion carried.

#### B. Recommendation for 12-Member Board

Recommended change to A.R.S. 32-102 is shown on Minute Page 4473.

MOTION: It was moved by Mr. Goodwin and seconded by Mr. Trimble that the Executive Director be authorized to contact the Legislature to determine whether this recommended change can be considered by the Legislature in its special session. Motion passed.

The board considered Mr. Podolsky's request, reviewed information received from the Educational Testing Service verifying that Mr. Podolsky had passed all parts of this exam, and reviewed Mr. Podolsky's updated file record.

MOTION: It was moved by Mr. Trimble and seconded by Dr. O'Bannon that Mr. Podolsky be added to the Granted Registration List after July 1, 1980. Motion carried.

#### (3) Credit for Cumulative Grades on Architectural Exam Parts

MOTION: It was moved by Mr. Goodwin and seconded by Dr. O'Bannon that, effective July 1, 1980, credit be given to all examinees for parts passed on Section B of the Professional Examination and that registration be granted to those who have passed all four parts. Motion carried.

#### B. LANDSCAPE ARCHITECTURAL EVALUATION COMMITTEE

Mr. Earley presented the report of the Landscape Architectural Evaluation Committee shown on Minute Page 4477.

Mr. Norman Lee Aubuchon, a registered landscape architect, appeared before the board to inquire about a complaint he had made regarding a non-registered landscape architect and to alert the board that applicant, <u>William Davis Tonnesen</u>, has been practicing landscape architecture without being registered and may not be of good moral character and repute as required under A.R.S. 32-122.

MOTION: It was moved by Mr. Gookin and seconded by Mr. Trimble that the board table action on Mr. Tonnesen's application until his application can be investigated further, taking into account the allegations made. Motion failed.

MOTION: In view of the allegations made to the board regarding William Davis Tonnesen, it was moved by Dr.O'Bannon and seconded by Mr.Earley that Mr.Tonnesen be admitted to the LAIT exams as recommended by the Committee and that an investigation of Mr.Tonnesen's activities and background be conducted, including contacting the following sources of information:

#### COMMENTARY

on

the Sunset Review Process and Revisions to the Arizona Technical Registration Act (ARS Title 32, Chapter 1)

A. The Arizona Legislature completed action on Sunset Review of the Arizona Board of Technical Registration with passage of Senate Bill 1020, and subsequent acceptance by the Governor allowed the bill to become law on April 28, 1980.

Attached to the amendment of Title 32, Chapter 1, were revisions to the Sunset Law, Title 41, Chapter 20, extending the life of the Board until June 30, 1982 and requiring at that time that "Sunset Review of the State Board of Technical Registration shall consider in particular whether the Board has:

 Established an aggressive peer review program working in conjunction with the various building safety departments throughout this state.

Informed the public and registrants of its oversight responsibilities and the results of its disciplinary actions.

 Improved the documentation of its decision-making process to allow for a thorough, independent qualitative evaluation of the process.

4. Adopted methods to encourage public input and participation in the promulgation of rules and regulations, the development of legislative proposals and other decision-making processes of the board."

B. In view of this legislative mandate we would also like to comment on the Board's progress in satisfying the criticisms of the Auditor General in his report to the Legislature, October 1979, as follows:

It is recommended that:

 The State Board of Technical Registration establish an aggressive peer review program that would work in conjunction with the various building safety departments throughout the state.

#### COMMENT:

This recommendation represents a new program for which the Board had neither the staff nor the budget to implement. Additional personnel was first requested in 1970, and our continuing request in our 1980-81 budget for an additional position received a negative recommendation from the Executive Budget Office and the Joint

Legislative Budget Committee. Continued work with these committees and the Legislature reversed this, and funding was provided for two new positions starting in July of 1980. In June and July we expect to recruit new people. In August and September we will develop our peer review program and train the new people to implement the program in October.

 The Board increase its license renewal fee to fund additional complaint investigations work.

#### COMMENT:

Anticipating the need for more funding, the Board first proposed increased renewal fees and held public hearings on March 2, 1979. The Attorney General refused to certify the rule change, because the rule contained a waiver for elderly registrants that was not supported by statute. On July 20, 1979 the Board held a public hearing on the revised renewal fee change, and the rule was adopted subject to the Attorney General's approval, which finally came October 25, 1979, permitting the adoption of the rule changing renewal fees from \$10 to \$15 annually on November 16, 1979. This late action delayed preparation of renewal notices.

The Board inform the public and its licensees of its oversight responsibilities and the results of its disciplinary actions.

#### COMMENT:

Newsletters and press releases are part of the peer review and enforcement program described under Item 1, scheduled for implementation in October. The Board has published a short newsletter for the past year, and this effort will be continued and refined.

4. The Board make a concerted effort to continue to develop formal evaluative criteria regarding 1) the determination of the adequacy of an applicant's experience, and 2) the requirement for examination. Once developed, these criteria should be incorporated into the Board's rules and regulations.

#### COMMENT:

With the revision of the statute (A.R.S.32, Chapter 1), the Board has initiated a completely new draft of rules and regulations based on the legislative revisions and expects to satisfy most of the Auditor General's concerns. Experience requirements are complex. The Board has experience requirements in architecture defined through recently completed work in the Intern Development Program by NCARB and AIA committees. The complex task remaining for the Board is to make a similar definition for assayers, geologists, landscape architects, land surveyors and seventeen branches of engineering.

We will be consulting deeply with professional societies in all these areas. The Board has ordered a crash, highest-priority effort with outside consultants' assistance to permit new rules and regulations to be published by September 1980.

 The Board improve the documentation of its decision-making process to allow for a thorough, independent, qualitative evaluation of the process.

#### COMMENT:

The Board implemented changes in documentation of its decisions in June of 1978 when it authorized the use of recording equipment for documentation of Board meeting actions. In October 1979 when the Board initiated new Enforcement Committee meetings, the recording equipment has been consistently used to record the proceedings. Minutes are prepared from tape transcripts.

 Arizona Revised Statutes, Section 32-127 and the Board's Rule R4-30-29 be amended to allow for the implementation of a triennial renewal system.

#### COMMENT:

The Board recommended a staggered triennial renewal system to the Legislature, and it was adopted in Senate Bill 1020. Work is in process to implement it. In essence the system will be implemented for 1981 renewals by billing a prorated fee from December 31, 1980 to one of perhaps 18 different class dates over the 3-year period. After the initial billing, renewals will be from a class date for a 3-year period. We plan to define the renewal classes in the Board's new rules and regulations, targeted for September publication.

7. The Board's Rule R4-30-17 be amended to delete the mandatory requirement for personal audiences; and, the Board implement an application review process similar to the one used by the Kansas Board.

#### COMMENT:

The Board held a public hearing on February 28, 1980 for a proposed rule change to comply with the Auditor General's recommendation No. 7. On March 7, the Board was informed by the Attorney General that the proposed rule change could not be certified without a change in the law. The matter will be addressed again in the present revision of the rules and regulations, targeted for September publication.

 The Board adopt a policy requiring non-governmental recipients of the annual roster to pay a nominal fee to cover publication and distribution costs.

#### COMMENT:

On February 22, 1980 the Board held a public hearing on a proposed rule change (R4-30-30) to permit a charge for the Annual List of Active Registrants, and on March 6 it forwarded the rule to the Attorney General for certification.

The office of the Attorney General expects to certify the rule change in time for Board adoption at its June 6, 1980 meeting.

 The Board of Technical Registration adopt methods to encourage public input and participation in the promulgation of rules and regulations, the development of legislative proposals and other decision-making processes of the Board.

#### COMMENT:

The Board has taken steps to expand its mailing list for notification of meetings; it has established contact with professional societies for the purpose of advice and counsel in formulating rules and legislative proposals; it has authorized the Executive Director to work with advisory committees in Geology and Land Surveying for purposes of evaluation of qualifications and enforcement matters. The Board has also authorized the Executive Director to use newspaper advertising for matters affecting the public-at-large.

 Arizona Revised Statutes, Sections 32-102 and 32-103, be amended to provide for public membership on the State Board of Technical Registration.

#### COMMENT:

The Board recommended and the Legislature agreed to provide public membership on the Board. That has been implemented in Senate Bill 1020.

C. Regarding the changes to the Technical Registration Act (ARS Title 32, Chapter 1), registrants are advised to note the following changes:

#### 32-101. Definitions

The landscape architectural practice definition was revised by removing "the design of structures or facilities with separate and self-contained purposes for habitation or industry, such as are ordinarily included in the practice of engineering or architecture" from the prohibitions provided in the original definition.

This <u>does</u> not permit landscape architects to practice engineering or architecture. They are limited by ARS 32-143 to their own disciplinary practice, the same as all other disciplines, with the exception of cross-practice allowed under 32-143.

32-102. Board of Technical Registration.

The composition of the Technical Registration Board was changed. The reduction of architectural and engineering members by one and two respectively in order to provide for new permanent seats for landscape architects, land surveyors, geologists or assayers, and the public member is regarded as an unfortunate legislative response to the committee system through which the Board does its work. This decrease in membership in engineering and architecture will require the Board to seek outside assistance through voluntary contributions of expertise or will require the Board to hire this expertise as consultants in order to perform the evaluation functions required by law.

32-103. Qualifications of Members
Age requirement was changed from 35 years to 25 years. Years of registration requirement for Board membership was changed from ten to five years. The Board believes these changes will not have an adverse effect on the quality of board background for exercising mature professional judgement.

32-104. Compensation.

Board members may be compensated for service now--up to \$30 per day of service. The waiver of renewal fees for Board members was deleted.

32-105. Organization.

Definition of quorum (3 engineers, 2 architects) was removed from the law. This will now be defined by rule.

32-106. Powers and Duties.
Items F & G were added, giving the Board authority to adopt rules of professional conduct and enabling them to require evidence of continuing competency to practice as a condition of license renewal.

The rules of professional conduct will assist the Board in explaining its oversight responsibility to the public and will contribute toward providing a measure of professional performance to judge competency to practice.

The power to require evidence of continuing competency as a condition of license renewal will permit the Board to consider making rules at such time as there appears to be a uniform standard among the several states comprising the Rocky Mountain and Western Regions of the United States.

32-110. Immunity from Personal Liability
This was added to the statute.

32-122. Qualifications of Applicant

The words "education and experience" were added to the statute, giving the Board, for the first time, the opportunity to consider educa-

tional requirements in its rules for qualifying applicants.

- 32-126. Registration Without Examination.

  Language was added defining the Board s position in considering comity registrations.
- This section was completely rewritten to provide for a triennial renewal system. In addition, it gives the Board power to waive the renewal fee for elderly registrants who are retired, thus renewing a practice the Board had followed for the past eight years, but which was declared illegal for 1980 renewals by the Attorney General. All elderly retired registrants who wish to maintain their registration under this provision must be current and paid up for the 1980 renewal fees. Many registrants chose to be delinquent or to cease being registered when the above ruling required a fee for 1980. We urge registrants who are retired and who are aged 65 years or over to get in good standing now, so that the 1981 fees can be subject to the Board's proposed new waiver rule.
- 32-128. Revocation of Certificate; Censure; Probation; Hearing; Notice of Findings
  A.4 was added, giving the Board added basis for considering revocation, censure and probation actions. In B. subpoena power was added.

In D. censure and probation actions. In B. subpoena power was added. In D. censure, probation and fines were added to increase the Board's options in determining disciplinary findings. Probation and fines will be a strong deterrent to registrants considering a violation of the statutes or the rules and regulations of the Board.

- 32-129. Confidentiality of Records
  This new section was added, giving the Board a legal basis for maintaining confidentiality of sensitive records. It is the Board's intention that an applicant may review his own examination material, notwithstanding confidentiality of a particular class of material.
- 32-141. Firm or Corporate Practice
  This section was revised and Section B was added requiring firms and corporations to identify their registrants by filing a form with the Board. In complying with this provision, please use the enclosed form. Where your firm receives additional copies, please save them to use in filing revisions and/or changes of responsible principals.
- 32-144. Exemptions and Limitations
  - A. A consulting associate of a registrant is no longer exempt from requirements of the statute. All the disciplines registered under this chapter must be licensed to practice. Cross-practice in disciplines other than that of your registration is governed by ARS32-125 and 32-143.
  - B. Manufacturing industry was added to communications common carriers and public service corporations under the exemption defined by this section.

Mr. Podolsky appeared with his attorney, Nannette M. Warner, to appeal Mr. Podolsky's failing grade on Sect. B of the Professional Examination, December 1979. Mr. Podolsky passed Parts 1,2 and 4; failed Part B. (His examination record is attached.)

The hearing revealed that Mr. Podolsky had filed a separate application in Maryland and took the December 1975 exam there, receiving a fail for the exam as a whole, but passed Parts 2,3 and 4; failed Part 1. Dear Mr. George:

Continuing our correspondence concerning the recent board action on your application, you understood correctly from your personal audience that structural engineering registration in Arizona requires 24 hours of examination and that a comity situation such as yours would require that the deficiency in examination be brought up to Arizona's standard, thus the chairman's statement to you that you would be required to sit for Parts 5 & 6 of Arizona's structural examination. The board is willing to waive the fact that you may have been examineddin civil engineering in the NCEE's Principles and Practice of Engineering in lieu of the NCEE structural engineering examination which our Arizona applicants are required to take. Parts 5 & 6 of our Arizona examinations contain problems dealing with application of governing codes of various materials such as the AISC (steel), ACI (concrete), and AITC (wood). For a person practicing structural engineering, these exams should not be of major consequence, but do give the board assurance that you have a minimum level of technical competence in representing yourself as a structural engineer.

Examination and registration of engineers by discipline has been the case in Arizona since the process was begun in 1921 and has not changed. What has changed is the board's historic and valued use of judgement in determining whether a person is qualified to practice. This practice was branded "arbitrary and capricious" by the Auditor General in his recent audit of our agency, covering 15 years of activity. More and more, the Legislature, the Auditor General and the Attorney General are insisting that a uniform standard established by the board's rules and regulations apply equally to everyone.

Now, regarding your question of whether or not you must return to Arizona for the examination, this is an Arizona examination which no other board offers. We can, however, if hardship is evident or you are physically unable to make an appearaace, offer the exam under the security of your own board's procedures, to be proctored by the Oklahoma Board on the same day we give it here in Arizona.

I hope, Mr. George, that this will clarify your understanding of the board's action in processing your application.

I have reviewed with interest your correspondence with the Arizona State Board of Technical Registration. It will be circulated as a matter of concern at the May 9 meeting of the Oklahoma Board.

There is no arrangement between Arizona and Oklahoma for what you have referred to as "reciprocity". We have observed a relationship of comity in exchanging information, and in accepting the results of NCEE examinations on applications received from our respective registered residents. Every applicant must of course meet the statutory requirements of the state to which he is making application.

The correspondence indicates that Arizona has in fact accepted the examination results from Vermont (Fundamentals) and Oklahoma (Principles, Civil). In the NCEE format, Civil and Structural are set up as different disciplines with separate examinations. You might ask Arizona if your election of Civil is the reason for additional examination for a Structural designation under Arizona Statutes.

On March 12, 1980, I received written notification that my application for registration as a Professional Engineer in the state of Arizona was denied by Board action. The purpose of this correspondence is to request reconsideration of the Board in its action pertaining to my application. In making this request, I would like to present the following information:

- 1. I am willing to be registered in any classification deemed appropriate for my qualifications provided I will not be required to submit to and pass an additional examination conducted by the State Board of Arizona. Having been duly registered by the state of Oklahoma as a Professional Engineer by examination, my intention in making application to the Arizona Board in October of 1979 was to gain registration on a reciprocal basis. On January 18, 1980, during a personal audience with the Arizona Board Professional Engineering Evaluation Committee, I was informed that should I elect to be registered as a Structural Engineer, I would be required to pass a special examination on Structural Engineering. I was also informed that the evaluation committee would present my application to the general board as a Civil Engineer, if I so desired, with no recommendation to the general board for denial or acceptance.
- I would like to point out that in deciding what branch of engineering was most appropriate for me, I very carefully studied Arizona Code #32-122A. Under this section of the code, it is stated that..."study satisfactorily completed in an architectural, engineering, geological, or landscape architectural school approved by the Board up to a maximum of five years, may be considered equivalent to one year of active engagement". The education that I received at the Universtiy of Vermont cannot be described as anything but a well rounded Civil Engineering education for which I was ultimately rewarded with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Civil Engineering. In light of this understanding, I question the finding of the evaluation committee that "virtually all your experience has been in structural engineering". I consider the education that I have received to be a very important aspect of my experience as a Civil Engineer.

- 3. In denying my application for registration as a Civil Engineer, do I understand that the board is of the opinion that Structural Engineering is not a bona fide practice for a Civil Engineer?
- 4. I would like to point out to the board that it is my understanding that the ethical practice of any Professional Engineer demands that he practice within the confines of his competance. If granted registration in Arizona, I would like the board to know that I intend to practice in an ethical manner as a Professional Engineer.

I would like to ask the Board to review what I am presenting herein as my understanding of the board's action pertaining to my application for registration up to this date:

#### January 4, 1980:

Having received a complete application along with required references, the board invited me to a personal audience with the Evaluation Committee on January 18, 1980.

## January 18, 1980:

I completed a 20 minute examination on comprehension of the Arizona Laws conducted by the Arizona Board at their office. I attended a personal audience with the Board's Engineering Evaluation Committee which consisted of two board members, F. Mark Edson - Architect and Rod J. Gomez - Civil and Structural Engineer. It was stated to me at that time, that if I wished to apply as a Structural Engineer, I would have to return to Arizona to take an additional examination on Structural Engineering.

## March, 12, 1980:

I receive correspondence from the Board that my application had been denied. The board acted upon the recommendation of the Engineering Evaluation Committee, which, I assume, was the same committee that conducted the personal audience.

### Gentlemen:

In response to your letter of February 25,1980, I hereby request that you reconsider my application for registration as a Civil Engineer as provided for in section R4-30-02 of the rules of the board. I do not know that a personal appearance is necessary, but if you would prefer that I make one I would be glad to do so. In any event, I wish to make several comments.

The idea that I lack experience as a Civil Engineer, because most of my experience has been in the structural area, is difficult to accept. Expecially since I have always thought that structural design was a branch of civil engineering.

Since neither the registration law, nor the Rules of the Board, define civil engineering or structural engineering one must rely on definition from other sources. To this end I have enclosed a copy of a page from the catalog of the Missouri School of Mines and Metallurgy, which is now the University of Missouri at Rolla, which I think adequately supports my contention that structural design is a branch of civil engineering.

I believe there is also support for my position in the registration laws of other states. The state of California requires registration as a Civil Engineer and additional experience and testing before a person can be registered as a Structural Engineer. Similarly, the state of Washington considers Structural Engineering to be a specialized branch and requires initial registration in another, more basic branch.

As you know from my application, I am presently registered in nineteen states, of which eighteen are by reciprocity. Of those nineteen states I am registered as a Civil Engineer in the nine states that have registration by branch. This includes six states that recognize Structural Engineering as a separate branch and at least one, Oregon, appears to have the same requirements as Arizona. There was no suggestion by any of these states that I was not qualified as a Civil Engineer. While I realize that Arizona is not bound by the actions of other states, it seems strange to me that you would take a position so different from these other states.

puring the course of my conversation with the evaluation committee, concern was expressed about pending sunset law review of the functions of the Board of Technical Registration. They stated that they exercise special care in reviewing applicant's experience records to insure consistency. However, it appears that the evaluation committee is applying a totally arbitrary definition of Civil Engineering, which is inconsistant with the classical definition and customary functions of the profession.

The evaluation committee also gave me the impression that they wanted me to apply for registration as a Structural Engineer because they felt the work I do should be done by a Structural Engineer. In addition, they indicated that a Civil Engineer's registration might not be sufficient for some agencies I might have to deal with. However, the requirement for a Structural Engineer's seal instead of a Civil Engineer's on certain types of work is not spelled out in the registration law, but is left up to the various approval and specifying organizations. Likewise, neither the registration law, nor the rules of the board delineate a demarcation line between civil and structural engineering. I cannot believe that none of the Civil Engineers in your state design structures.

In conclusion, I must ask what conditions have created a situation where a person with two degrees in civil engineering and registration as a Civil Engineer in nine other states is not qualified to practice as a Civil Engineer in Arizona. Do you feel the courts would uphold your position?

I trust that you will consider these comments and reverse your previous denial of my application for registration as a Civil Engineer.

I enjoyed very much being in your state in January while taking my multiple choice examination and interview with the two board members and Mark Edson.

I am writing to explain why at this time I have chosen to be registered as a Civial Engineer rather than a Structural Engineer.

As a Sr. Engineer at Lumbermate I design and detail wooden trusses and check designs that the other engineers in our company have made. I am enclosing some typical examples. Most of the trusses we design are for residential use, agricultural pole barns, commercial warehouses or small commercial offices. The finished truss designs are sent to truss fabricators in 23 states and total approximately 8000 designs per year and in only one place has a Structural seal been required, Lake County, Illinois which is adiacent to Chicago. All of our other designs are sealed with either a Professional or Civil Engineers seal and we have never had any problem with this type of light construction requiring a Structural seal.

At this moment we do not have any truss fabricators in Arizona that we furnish engineering for and do not anticipate furnishing any engineering for any Arizona truss fabricators in the immediate future, however, before we can actively promote selling our truss plates and the engineering that goes with them we should have an Arizona registration so that we would be able to seal our Own engineering in the event that an Arizona truss fabricator benan buying our plates.

### STAFF

Our staff is back in full compliment with the appointment of Lavern Douglas as an application examiner on May 5, 1980.

Reclassification activity is still in process. Virginia's scheduled change from Administrative Secretary (Grade 12) to Business Manager I (Grade 15) was forwarded by the Governor's Commission on Personnel May 28, 1980, and we are hopeful that the Personnel Division's Classification Section will report it out favorably by the middle of June.

We are initiating now the original classification of our new Investigator position, and we should have that completed also by the middle of June when we expect to be recruiting. Our newly approved Clerk-Typist position will not be filled until January 1, 1981.

I have reviewed your letter concerning a proposed investigation by the State Board into events surrounding the recent flood emergency. I agree with you that the Board, in this area, as all others, should be vigilant in the performance of the duties mandated by A.R.S. §32-128. Therefore, to the extent that information comes to the Board suggesting that an architect, engineer, or other licensee has engaged in acts of "gross negligence, incompetence, bribery, or other misconduct in the practice of his profession," I strongly believe that an investigation is required. To the extent that your current funding is not sufficient to carry out these statutory duties, I would be amenable to considering necessary supplemental budget requests.

I would be reluctant, however, to see the Board undertake an investigation which might conflict with the hearings being currently conducted by the Joint Legislative Committee.

I would therefore suggest that your request for such a significant amount of additional funding would properly be addressed to the Committee, to which you could explain the specific purposes of your proposed investigation.

Dear Governor Babbitt:

Under the Arizona Revised Statutes the State Board of Technical Registration is vested with the authority and responsibility for two major functions. The primary function of the board is to determine the qualifications required for registration as architects, assayers, engineers, geologists, land surveyors, and landscape architects and to grant registration to those applicants meeting the requirements of the Board. The second, lesser-known responsibility of the Board is an oversight function described and authorized by A.R.S. 32-128. In that section it is stated, among other things, that "the Board may take disciplinary action against the holder of a certificate under this chapter, charged with the commission of any of the following acts: gross negligency, incompetence, bribery, or other misconduct in the practice of his profession."

The section further provides that the Board has the authority to make investigations, employ investigators and conduct hearings to determine whether a license issued under this chapter should be revoked or suspended.

As you are well aware, the State of Arizona has been severely damaged by a series of floods which have destroyed bridges, obliterated subdivisions, consumed vital real property interests including a portion of the Phoenix international airport, and disrupted transportation in various locations throughout the State. 1980 is the third successive year such disasters have occurred. These disasters, though seeming to be Acts of God, have given rise to a swelling public concern, given credence by the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee for Sunset Review, that there may be negligence, incompetence, bribery or other misconduct associated with the practice of those responsible for the design, construction, operation and maintenance of bridges, reservoirs, and flood control facilities throughout the State.

It is the consensus of the State Board of Technical Registration that the time has come for the Board to conduct investigations and hold hearings pursuant to A.R.S. 32-128.B for the purpose of determining the validity of public concern about professional competence and further to establish a clear and factual record of responsibility for professional and technical decisions surrounding the design, construction, operation and maintenance of the bridges, reservoirs and flood control structures or systems which have yielded under the pressure of recent flood waters.



These structures and systems are, for the most part, products of some of the state's largest and most complex governmental institutions; and further, federal bureaus may be involved in the design process that produces these facilities. The Board has no interest, nor has it the authority, to conduct a study of the cause or to propose solutions to the problem. It is the consensus of the Board that we can best serve the public interest of the State of Arizona by conducting a fact-finding investigation into the design and operational processes and track the professional decisions that may have contributed to failure of expensive structures and destruction of valuable real property interests. Our society has never been so affluent that it can afford to build the same bridges year after year.

The Board is eminently qualified as a jury of peers to take on this mission, and the Arizona Revised Statutes place the responsibility within its purview. Relying as we do on application fees, renewal fees, and examination fees to provide funds for our operation, it is plainly evident that the Board has neither the staff nor the financial base to undertake a task of this importance and magnitude, and we recognize the futility of beginning the investigation unless it is certain that it can be carried to completion.

It is the considered opinion of this Board, in order to begin and fulfill the charge of the referenced statute, that a deeply versed hearing officer is necessary, assisted by an investigative attorney versed in water law and damage litigation, qualified hydrologists, civil engineers, structural engineers and geotechnical specialists, supported by sufficient clerical and investigative staff to maintain a constant hearing agenda and to assemble through court reporters day-by-day and week-by-week a complete factual record surrounding each and every failure. While the Board's interest is in professional performance, the public record that is generated by our hearing process can have an enormous impact on the public and professional decision-making process affecting future investment of public funds in new facilities and systems.

To embark upon such a program without the ability to follow through could be far worse than ignoring the problem. It is our aim to provide a valuable public service—one which only we can adjudicate. We will do everything possible through legal proceedings to conduct our hearings as expeditiously as possible and to work for a speedy resolution of our obligation to determine the facts.

Again, it is the Board's considered judgement that the investigation and hearings we recommend may cost in excess of one quarter of a million dollars. Since the Board does not have resources of this magnitude, we sincerely ask your advice and counsel before beginning to document a request to the legislature for a supplemental appropriation to support this investigation. We do not believe it is rational to proceed without the approval and support of your office. Your immediate attention to our modest proposal is earnestly solicited.

I represent Mr. Miles K. Mikolas. As you know, my client has applied for registration as a land surveyor and has completed all requirements on his part. It is my understanding that he only awaits receipt by the Board of his examination grade for registration.

It has come to my attention that the legislature in the last session has amended parts of the law under which registration is accomplished. In particular, with regard to land surveyor the experience requirements have been increased from four to six years. My client is understandably concerned and has requested that I inquire of you his status.

It is my understanding that the new law will not take effect until July 31, 1980, and that historically licenses or registrations have always been issued prior to that time; therefore, he should not be concerned. The question in my mind is, what would happen if for some reason the new law would take effect prior to his registration. To answer this question I have researched the question. The case of Peterson v. Livestock Commission, 181 P.2d 152 (1947) specifically holds that a license will be issued under the old law when the applicant has

I acknowledge receipt of your letter of May 21, 1980 and wish to comment as follows:

The amendments to Title 32, Chapter I, took effect on filing and became law on April 28, 1980. I am enclosing a copy of our newly published booklet incorporating the changes.

Your position concerning Mr. Mikolas is moot. The Board did not act to approve or disapprove the Engineering Committee's recommendation concerning experience requirements; they voted to continue processing the file and to admit Mr. Mikolas to the April examinations. (See attached copy of exceppts from the December 6 Board meeting's minutes.)

The Board is currently initiating a complete rewrite of the rules and regulations to reflect the recent changes in the law, and I'm certain they will address transition of pending applications where experience requirements have changed. I believe it is reasonable to assume that if Mr. Mikolas does indeed pass the examinations, then his position would be favorable with respect to completing his processing in accord with the law at the time the Board took its previous action and the experience requirements then prevailing were completed satisfactorily. On the other hand, should Mr. Mikolas fail the examinations, I don't believe I can even guess how the yet-to-be-formulated transition rule would affect his processing.

I will bring your letter to the attention of the Board at its regular June 6 meeting.

This is in reference to Chris Brozek, an employee with our firm who applied for and was admitted to examination as a professional engineer. Chris is an architect and urban planner who has, to the best of my knowledge, no formal education in engineering. Furthermore, in the seven years that I have known him, he also has no experience in the area of professional engineering.

It is my belief that the work experience listed on Chris' application for examination is the engineering work turned out by our company over the past seven or more years, with which he has had no direct association. He has headed up our planning division over that period, whereas I have been in the position of Chief Engineer. Chris has made no contribution whatever to any of the engineering work we have done in that period.

If what I suspect is true, there is a good deal of dishonesty associated with his application. I also seriously question the ethics of those who served as his references and certified that he should be registered as a professional engineer.

This is a matter of serious concern to me and to a number of others to whom I have spoken about the matter. I would appreciate an in-depth investigation by the Board as to the authenticity of the information supplied by Chris Brozek on his application.

MOTION: It was moved by Mr. Gookin that registration be granted to Arnold Morgan Johnson in Land Surveying and Geological Engineering. Mr. Earley seconded the motion.

After discussion of the motion, Mr. Gookin amended his motion to grant registration to Mr. Johnson in Land Survey-

ing only and to make recommendation regarding Mr. Johnson's application in Geological Engineering to the board in September. Mr. Earley seconded the amended motion. Motion, as amended, passed.

#### MINUTES OF MEETING ARIZONA STATE BOARD OF TECHNICAL REGISTRATION

SEPTEMBER 5, 1980

The regular quarter-annual meeting of the State Board of Technical Registration was held at Northern Arizona University, Room 206, College of Engineering, Flagstaff, Arizona, on Friday, September 5, 1980. The meeting was called to order by Chairman Rod J. Gomez at 10:02 a.m. following a reception hosted by the Dean of the College of Engineering with Faculty and students.

PRESENT:

Rod J. Gomez, Chairman Wayne O. Earley, Secretary William S. Gookin, Member Jimmie R. Nunn, Member John B. Riggs, Member Charles E. O'Bannon, Member (Pending reappointment)

ABSENT: Evelyn Epstein, Assistant Attorney

General

F. Mark Edson, Executive Director Patricia Wood, Administrative Secretary

Those present constituted a quorum.

The Chairman recognized Mr. Don Zimba, President of the Northern Arizona Section of ASPE, and Mr. Harley Heith, President of the Northern Arizona Section, ASCE, who jointly presented a statement of confidence in the Board's activities, and offered assistance to the Board in furthering the work of the Board in Northern Arizona.

The Chariman expressed the appreciation of the Board for this support and suggested that they might immediately work to get a Flagstaff professional to fill one of the vacancies on the Board.

#### 1. READING OF MINUTES

- A. MOTION: It was moved by Mr. Gookin and seconded by Mr. Earley that the minutes of the Special Board Meeting, held July 18, 1980, be approved as presented. Motion carried.
- B. It was moved by Mr. Riggs and seconded by Mr. Gookin that the Special Meeting of August 1, 1980, be approved as presented and mailed.

#### 2. REPORT OF THE RULES AND BY-LAWS COMMITTEE:

Due to vacancies on the Board, the Committee has not met. The Executive Director reported progress on certification of the emergency rules adopted by the Board subject to certification at their August 1, meeting. The Assistant Attorney General has pointed out many inconsistencies in the Statute which affect the rules developed by the Board, particularly in the definitions (ARS 32-101) of In-Training examinations and experience requirements. It appears that all mention of these criteria in the definition should be deleted so they can be adequately defined by the rules. Consideration of the effect of the Assistant Attorney General's comments has delayed further processing

of these rule changes, and will require further review by the Board after new drafts are completed.

### 3. REPORT OF THE LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE: (Gookin, Earley, 1 vacancy)

The Committee has no report of recommendations at this time, but the following items have come to the Board for further consideration:

- A. Letter from Arizona Land Surveyor's Association regarding legislative recommendations.
- B. 12 member Board
- C. Landscape Architecture exemptions (32-144)
- D. Miscellaneous items:
  - 32-108 Change annual report date to fiscal year.
  - 32-101 Clean up language in In-Training definitions to refer to all qualification and exam requirements to the rules and regulations of the Board.

#### E. Other items:

Review exemptions for mining companies and utilities.

ACTION: The above items were referred to the Legislative Committee for study and recommendation to the Board at the December 5 meeting.

#### 4. REPORT OF THE EVALUATION COMMITTEES:

#### A. ARCHITECTURAL EVALUATION COMMITTEE

The Architectural Evaluation Committee Report was presented by Mr. Nunn. Report is shown on Minute Pages 4568 & 4569.

MOTION: It was moved by Mr. Nunn and seconded by Mr. Gookin that Parts 1, 2, 3, and 4 of the Architectural Committee Report be accepted, certified and implemented by the Board. Motion carried.

#### B. LANDSCAPE ARCHITECTURAL EVALUATION COMMITTEE:

Mr. Earley presented the report of the Landscape Architectural Evaluation Committee shown on Minute Page 4577.

MOTION: It was moved by Mr. Earley and seconded by Mr. Gookin that Part 1 of the report be accepted, and implemented.

Mr. William Tonnesen appeared before the Board to appeal the Board's decision (Minute page 4457) to hold him only for the LAIT exams, and stated his view that he was qualified to take the professional exam in Landscape Architecture, as well. He presented further evidence of qualification which he explained was not in his application because it might be construed as illegal professional activity and also submitted teaching experience.

Mr. Earley summed up the Committee's position in stating that the total required experience record of 8 years might be re-evaluated

to add to the 5 years of credit allowed by the Board, but that Mr. Tonnesen must fulfill the requirement of at least one year under the supervision of a Registered Landscape Architect, to complete the required 8 years of satisfactory education and experience.

MOTION: It was moved by Mr. Earley and seconded by Mr. Nunn that the adoption of Part 2 of the report be upheld. Motion carried.

PRESENTATION OF AWARD: Ms. Kathy Emery, Vice President Arizona Chapter of American Society of Landscape Architects, was introduced as a guest of Mr. Earley. Ms. Emery then spoke on behalf of the Arizona Chapter of the ASLA wherein Mr. Earley was presented an award for outstanding service to the profession of Landscape Architecture and for his efforts in providing for the protection of the health, safety, and welfare of the public through recent legislative efforts.

#### C. ENGINEERING EVALUATION COMMITTEE REPORT:

Dr. O'Bannon presented the report of the Engineering Evaluation Committee shown on Minute Pages 4580/84 .

#### Part 1 - Recommendation for Professional Registration

The Executive Director pointed out that the name of William S. Gookin, Sr. appearing under Land Surveying section of Part 1, was included under Part 12 of the report for consideration at that time, and the name should be deleted from consideration under Part 1.

MOTION: It was moved by Mr. Gomez, seconded by Mr. Earley that the name be deleted. Motion carried.

MOTION: It was moved by Mr. Gomez and seconded by Mr. Earley that Part 1 of the report be accepted and implemented by the Board. Motion carried.

#### Part 2 - Recommendations for In-Training Certification

 $\frac{\text{MOTION:}}{\text{That Part 2 of the report be accepted and implemented by the Board.}}$  Motion carried.

#### Part 3 - Recommendations for Further Examination

The Executive Director pointed out that correspondence included under Item 11 - Reading of Correspondence may affect the Boards decision in holding out-of-state Land Surveyors for the legal principals of surveying examination (Part 4 - Land Surveying examination). 11 applicants, shown by "\*" under the Land Surveying section of Part 3, are in this status.

MOTION: It was moved by Mr. Earley and seconded by Dr. O'Bannon that the Board reaffirm its policy that out-of-state practitioners must have an understanding of Arizona law relating to Land Surveying before being licensed to practise in Arizona, and should take the Part 4 examination as recommended by the Committee. Motion carried.

The Board considered the appeal of Mr. Donald Ross, 80-396 for waiver of Parts 1 & 2 of the Geology exams based on his education and experience record. Considering also the recommendations of the Board's Advisory Panel in Geology concerning examination waivers.

MOTION: It was moved by Mr. Nunn, seconded by Mr. Rigg, that Parts 1 & 2 of the Geology examinations be waived as requested by Mr. Ross. Motion carried.

MOTION: It was moved by Dr. O'Bannon, seconded by Mr. Nunn, that Part 3 of the Engineering Report as amended, be accepted and implemented.

Dr. O'Bannon made a motion that a Board policy be set requiring 10 years experience, graduation from an accredited school, and 35 years of age before waiving of In-Training examinations. Motion failed for lack of second.

The Board discussed the newsletter, an information sheet, public information for Board review prior to release and inquired about the peer review program.

Mr. Earley requested actions of Board meetings should be reported to the news media immediately after Board meetings.

Dr. O'Bannon requested the newspapers be contacted a few days prior to our quarterly Board meetings with information as to major items up for discussion.

Mr. Gomez suggested the development of a one-page,  $8\frac{1}{2} \times 11$  inch sheet of paper be used on which information would be given as to how often the public information letters go out with a list of the names and addresses of the parties to whom it goes.

Mr. Gomez suggested that any information that is released first be submitted to the Board for review.

Mr. Edson indicated the peer review program could be initiated within six weeks or so.

#### 8. REPORT OF THE BUDGET COMMITTEE

The Executive Director received the Budget request for fiscal year 81/82, shown on pages 4601/05 .

Mr. Gookin and Mr. Earley expressed concern that the request did not address a need they felt that the Executive Director should be backed up by a Deputy, knowledgeable in all aspects of the office to function in the absence of the Director.

The Executive Director explained that this concern was being partially addressed through:

- the new Administrative Assistant position just filled in the enforcement area, and in the budget request for back-up in this area.
- 2. in the recent replacement of the Administrative Secretary and a training program implemented through that position of all staff positions
- 3. a new budget request for a supervisory position in the application and examination program, thus providing more time for quality control of all office functions through the Administrative Secretarial position (office business manager), and that development of a full fledged Deputy Director position should gain more credence as the reorganization and staffing of the vital operating programs of the Board are allowed to develop over the next two or three years.

The Executive Director also pointed out that this budget request did not address current deficiencies in the 1980/81 program of one time expense items in implementing the statutory changes, which items would be addressed in a special request for additional funds to the legislature in January, nor did it include funds for automation of our file maintance

functions, which were dependent on a survey being done by Data Center, which was not delivered at this time. These monies, depending on the survey recommendations, would be the subject of an amendment to our request when all data concerning it has been received from Data Center Consultants.

MOTION: It was moved by Dr. O'Bannon and seconded by Mr. Nunn to accept the 1981/82 budget request as presented. Motion carried.

## 1. Finding of Emergency

The Arizona Board of Technical Registration finds that the adoption of the following rules is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety and that notice and public procedure thereon are impracticable, unnecessary and contrary to the public interest because:

- 1. The Arizona Society of the American Institute of Architects, the Arizona Society of Professional Engineers, the Arizona Consulting Engineers Association, the Arizona Section, American Society of Landscape Architects, the Arizona Professional Land Surveyors Association, and the Arizona Section, American Institute of Professional Geologists have all participated in framing these emergency rules, and
- Processing of applications for professional registration is dependent on adoption of rules defining satisfactory standards of education, experience, and examination in the disciplines the Board registers, to comply with recent changes in Arizona Revised Statutes 32-122, 32-123, and 32-126, which mandated new requirements for definition of standards in the Boards rules and regulations.
- The public and professional confidence in the application process for registration could be severely harmed by suspension of this work until rules are properly noticed, submitted for public hearings, certified and adopted.
- 4. The public is best protected from possible restraint of trade resulting from suspension of registration activity by adoption of the following rules.

# II. Order of Rule Adoption

Pursuant to ARS § 32-106 and 41-1003 and on the basis of the aforestated findings, the Arizona Board of Technical Registration hereby amends without notice and public procedure the following rules and regulations:

Part 1. Section R4-30-03. Experience is repealed.

Part 2. Add a new Section R4-30-03 to read as follows:

R4-30-03 - EXPERIENCE

#### A. DEFINITIONS, GENERAL-

- 1. DEFINITIONS DEFINED UNDER ARS 32-101 ARE INCORPORATED HEREIN BY REFERENCE.
- 2. CONSULTATION. THE TERM "CONSULTATION" MEANS MEETINGS, DISCUSSIONS, WRITTEN OR VERBAL MESSAGES, REPORTS, ETC., INVOLVING SCIENTIFIC, AESTHETIC AND/OR TECHNICAL INFORMATION, FACTS, AND/OR ADVICE FOR PURPOSES OF PLANNING, DESIGNING, DECIDING, OR LOCATING CONSTRUCTION OR ALTERATION OF STRUCTURES, BUILDINGS, WORKS, MACHINES, PROCESSES, MATERIALS, LAND AREAS, OR PROJECTS.
- 3. INVESTIGATION. THE TERM "INVESTIGATION" MEANS CAREFUL SEARCH, EXAMINATION, INQUIRY OR STUDY TO REVEAL OR DETERMINE SCIENTIFIC, AESTHETIC AND/OR TECHNICAL INFORMATION AND/OR FACTS FOR THE PLANNING, DESIGN, LOCATION, CONSTRUCTION OR ALTERATION OF EXISTING OR PROPOSED STRUCTURES, BUILDINGS, WORKS, MACHINES, PROCESSES, MATERIALS, LAND AREAS OR PROJECTS.
- 4. EVALUATION. THE TERM "EVALUATION" MEANS CAREFUL SEARCH, EXAMINATION, OR INQUIRY TO REVEAL, DETERMINE OR ESTIMATE THE VALUE, WORTH, MERIT, EFFECT, EFFICIENCY OR PRACTICABILITY OF PLANNING, DESIGN, LOCATION, CONSTRUCTION, OR ALTERATION OF EXISTING PROPOSED STRUCTURES, BUILDINGS, WORKS, PROCESSES, MATERIALS, MACHINES, LAND AREAS OR PROJECTS.
- 5. SPECIFICATIONS. THE TERM "SPECIFICATIONS" MEANS THE SPECIFYING OF MATERIAL, EQUIPMENT, PERFORMANCE, PROJECTS, OR METHODS TO BE USED IN THE CONSTRUCTION OR ALTERATION OF BUILDINGS, STRUCTURES, WORKS, MACHINES, PROCESSES, LAND AREAS OR PROJECTS.
- 6. PLANNING. THE TERM "PLANNING" MEANS CAREFUL SEARCH, EXAMINATION, INQUIRY, STUDY, AND THE FORMULATION OR EXECUTION OF A STATEMENT, OUTLINE, DRAFT, MAP DRAWINGS, DIAGRAM OR PICTURE SHOWING ARRANGEMENT, SCHEME, SCHEDULE, PROGRAM OR PROCEDURE FOR LOCATING, BUILDING OR ALTERING EXISTING OR PROPOSED BUILDINGS, STRUCTURES, WORKS, MACHINES, PROCESSES, MATERIAL, LAND AREAS OR PROJECTS.
- 7. DESIGN. THE TERM "DESIGN" MEANS ANY SKETCH, PLAN, DRAWING, OUTLINE, STATEMENT, SCHEME, MODEL, OR PROCEDURE WHICH CONVEYS THE PLAN LOCATION, ARRANGEMENT, INTENT, PURPOSE, APPEARANCE AND NATURE OF CONSTRUCTION OR ALTERATION OF EXISTING OR PROPOSED BUILDING, STRUCTURES, WORKS, MACHINES, PROCESSES, MATERIALS, LAND AREAS OR PROJECTS.

- 8. EXPERIENCE CREDIT. EXPERIENCE ACCEPTABLE TO THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR, APPROVED BY THE BOARD AFTER EVALUATION OF THE APPLICATION.
- 9. APPROVED SCHOOLS OF SATISFACTORY STANDING. THOSE SCHOOLS WHOSE DEGREE PROGRAMS ARE ACCREDITED BY RECOGNIZED NATIONAL ACCREDITING AGENCIES.
- 10. REGISTRATION BASE STATE. THE STATE ORIGINALLY QUALIFYING A PERSON FOR FIRST REGISTRATION BY EXAMINATION OR OTHER QUALIFICATION.

#### B. DEFINITIONS OF EXPERIENCE LEVELS

- 1. "SUB-PROFESSIONAL WORK" SHALL BE CONSTRUED TO COVER THE TIME SPENT IN POSITIONS IN WHICH THE RESPONSIBILITY IS SLIGHT AND THE INDIVIDUAL PERFORMANCE OF A TASK, SET AND SUPERVISED BY A SUPERIOR, IS ALL THAT IS REQUIRED, SUCH AS JR. DRAFTSMAN, RODMAN/CHAINMAN, MATERIALS LAB TECHNICIAN, SHOP DRAWING CHECKER, ETC.
  - a) EACH YEAR OF EXPERIENCE IN SUB-PROFESSIONAL WORK, AS DEFINED HEREIN MAY BE CREDITED AS ONE HALF (½) YEAR, NOT TO EXCEED TWO YEARS OF CREDIT TOWARD THE TOTAL REQUIRED EXPERIENCE REQUIRED BY THE RULES FOR IN-TRAINING CERTIFICATION ONLY.
  - b) ONLY EXPERIENCE OF THE APPLICANT WHICH IS RELATED TO THE FIELD FOR WHICH THE APPLICATION IS FILED WILL BE CONSIDERED BY THE BOARD.
  - c) WORK DONE DURING YEARS COUNTED FOR EDUCATION IS CONCURRENT WITH CREDIT GRANTED FOR EDUCATION AND WILL NOT BE COUNTED AS ADDITIONAL EXPERIENCE CREDIT, EXCEPT THAT SUMMER WORK IN FULL-TIME ENGAGEMENTS BETWEEN SCHOOL TERMS OF AT LEAST 2½ MONTHS DURATION MAY BE COUNTED AS SUB-PROFESSIONAL WORK.
- 2. PRE-PROFESSIONAL WORK IS WORK PERFORMED BEFORE REGISTRATION WHICH IS OF A CHARACTER WORTHY OF THE PROFESSION AND IN THE DISCIPLINE FOR WHICH THE APPLICANT IS APPLYING. PRE-PROFESSIONAL WORK SHALL INCLUDE THE TIME AFTER THE APPLICANT HAS COMPLETED THE MINIMUM EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS, DURING WHICH HE HAS BEEN PERFORMING WORK OF A HIGHER GRADE AND RESPONSIBILITY THAN THAT DEFINED AS SUB-PROFESSIONAL WORK. SUCCESSFUL COMPLETION OF GRADUATE STUDY SHALL BE CONSIDERED PRE-PROFESSIONAL WORK, BUT SUCH STUDY WILL NOT BE CREDITED AS MORE THAN ONE YEAR OF PRE-PROFESSIONAL WORK. THE EXECUTION, AS A BUILDER OF WORK DESIGNED BY REGISTRANTS, OR THE SUPERVISION OF SUCH WORK AS FOREMAN, SUPERINTENDENT, OR CRAFTSMAN SHALL BE DEEMED TO BE SUB-PROFESSIONAL WORK

#### 3. PRE-PROFESSIONAL WORK (IN RESPONSIBLE CHARGE) MEANS

- a) IN THE FIELD, OR MANUFACTURING OR RESEARCH FACILITY, THE APPLICANT MUST HAVE DIRECTED THE WORK. THE SUCCESSFUL ACCOMPLISHMENT OF THE WORK MUST HAVE RESTED UPON HIM. HE MUST HAVE MADE DECISIONS REGARDING METHODS OF EXECUTION AND SUITABILITY OF MATERIALS, COMPONENTS OR DESIGN.
- b) IN THE OFFICE, THE APPLICANT MUST HAVE HAD TO UNDERTAKE INVESTIGATIONS, EVALUATIONS, CONSULTATIONS, DO PLANNING, WRITE SPECIFICATIONS, DIRECT DRAFTING, OR CALCULATE FOR DESIGNS OF IMPORTANT ASSIGNMENTS DEMANDING RESOURCEFULNESS AND ORIGINALITY.

  - b) GRADUATES OF OTHER SCHOOLS OF ARCHITECTURE NOT RECOGNIZED BY THE BOARD AS OF STAISFACTORY STANDING, WHO HAVE IN ADDITION ONE AND ONE-HALF YEARS OF PRE-PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCE CREDIT OF WHICH NOT MORE THAN ONE-HALF YEAR OF CREDIT MAY BE ON THE SUB-PROFESSIONAL LEVEL, ALL AS DEFINED IN SECTION R4-30-03, WHOSE APPLICATION IS

ENDORSED BY A REGISTERED ARCHITECT WHO IS HIS CURRENT OR FORMER EMPLOYER.

    OF A REGISTERED ARCHITECT IN ACTIVE PRACTICE.
  - b) GRADUATES OF AN APPROVED SCHOOL OF ARCHITECTURE OF SATJSFACTORY STANDING, WHO HAVE AT LEAST THREE ADDITIONAL YEARS OF PRE-PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCE CREDIT AS DEFINED IN SECTION R4-30-03, AND FURTHER DEFINED IN CONTENT UNDER PARAGRAPH B-1a OF THIS RULE. AT LEAST ONE YEAR OF THE PRE-PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCE REQUIREMENT SHALL BE EARNED UNDER THE DIRECT SUPERVISION OF A REGISTERED ARCHITECT IN ACTIVE PRACTICE.
  - c) QUALIFIED BY PRIOR REGISTRATION IN OTHER JURISDICTIONS UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES (ARS) 32-126.
  - d) GRADUATES OF A SCHOOL OF ARCHITECTURE NOT RECOGNIZED BY THE BOARD
    AS OF SATISFACTORY STANDING WHO HAVE AT LEAST FOURS YEARS OF APPROVED
    EDUCATIONAL CREDIT, AND FOUR ADDITIONAL YEARS OF PRE-PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCE
    CREDIT DEFINED BY RULE R4-30-03, AND FURTHER DEFINED AS TO CONTENT BY

SECTION B-1a OF THIS RULE. AT LEAST ONE YEAR OF THE PRE-PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCE REQUIREMENT SHALL BE EARNED UNDER THE DIRECT SUPERVISION OF A REGISTERED ARCHITECT IN ACTIVE PRACTICE.

  - a) APPLICANTS FOR ORIGINAL "BASE STATE REGISTRATION" WILL BE HELD FOR THE ARCHITECTURAL EXAMINATIONS CONSISTING OF THE NATIONAL STANDARD EXAMINATIONS (NCARB) TITLED:

QUALIFYING EXAMINATION (FOUR PARTS) - 9 HOURS
PART A - PROFESSIONAL EXAMINATION (DESIGN & SITE PLANNING) - 12 HOURS
PART B - PROFESSIONAL EXAMINATION (FOUR PARTS) - 16 HOURS



OF A SCHOOL OF ENGINEERING OR RELATED SCIENCE APPROVED BY THE BOARD AS OF SATISFACTORY STANDING, WHOSE DEGREE IS IN THE BRANCH SPECIFIED BY THE APPLICATION, WHO HAVE IN ADDITION AT LEAST FOUR YEARS OF PRE-PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCE CREDIT AS DEFINED BY SECTION R4-30-03 IN THE BRANCH SPECIFIED BY THE APPLICATION. A GRADUATE DEGREE (M.S.) MAY SUBSTITUTE FOR ONE YEAR OF PRE-PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCE.

  - b) GRADUATES (B.S.-GEOLOGY) OF AN APPROVED SCHOOL OF SATISFACTORY STANDING, WHO HAVE AN ADDITIONAL FOUR YEARS OF PRE-PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCE CREDIT IN GEOLOGY, GEOPHYSICS, GEOCHEMISTRY, GEOLOGICAL ENGINEERING OR OTHER GEOLOGICAL SCIENCE AS FURTHER DEFINED IN RULE R4-30-03. A GRADUATE DEGREE (M.S.-GEOLOGY) MAY SUBSTITUTE FOR ONE YEAR OF PRE-PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCE.
  - c) QUALIFIED BY PRIOR REGISTRATION IN OTHER JURISDICTIONS UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES ARS 32-126. THE STATUTE REQUIRES THAT REGISTRATION STANDARDS OF OTHER STATES, TO BE ACCEPT-ABLE, MUST BE SUBSTANTIALLY THE SAME AS ARIZONA STANDARDS.
  - d) ALL OTHER PERSONS SEEKING REGISTRATION TO PRACTICE GEOLOGY MUST BE CERTIFIED AS A GEOLOGIST-IN-TRAINING PRIOR TO FILING AN APPLICATION FOR REGISTRATION TO PRACTICE.

FUNDAMENTALS OF GEOLOGY - 2 PARTS - 8 HOURS
PRINCIPALS & PRACTICE OF GEOLOGY - 2 PARTS - 8 HOURS

- b) THE BOARD GRANTS CREDIT FOR EXAMINATION PARTS PREVIOUSLY PASSED IN ARIZONA, AND FOR COMPARABLE EXAMINATIONS PASSED IN OTHER JURIS-DICTIONS.
- c) THE BOARD MAY WAIVE THE FUNDAMENTALS OF GEOLOGY EXAMINATION FOR APPLICANTS WHO ARE GEOLOGY GRADUATES OF AN APPROVED SCHOOL OF SATISFACTORY STANDING AND WHO HAVE IN ADDITION TEN YEARS OF

PRE-PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCE CREDIT IN GEOLOGY, GEOPHYSICS, GEOCHEMISTRY, GEOLOGICAL ENGINEERING OR OTHER GEOLOGICAL SCIENCE AS DEFINED UNDER RULE R4-30-03 AND HAVE DEMONSTRATED PROFESSIONAL COMPETENCE IN IMPORTANT GEOLOGICAL STUDIES.

  - a) APPLICANTS WHO HOLD REGISTRATION CERTIFICATES IN OTHER STATES AND WHO HAVE MET THE EXAMINATION STANDARDS OF ARIZONA IN THE STATE OF THEIR BASE REGISTRATION, WILL BE REGISTERED WITHOUT FURTHER EXAMINATION.

  - a) GRADUATES, OR STUDENTS IN THE FINAL SEMESTER, OF AN APPROVED SCHOOL OF LANDSCAPE ARCHITECTURE OF SATISFACTORY STANDING, WHOSE APPLICATION IS ENDORSED BY THE DEAN OF THE SCHOOL, OR PROFESSOR SERVING AS THE STUDENT'S 5TH YEAR ADVISOR.
  - b) GRADUATES OF OTHER SCHOOLS OF LANDSCAPE ARCHITECTURE NOT RECOGNIZED BY THE BOARD AS OF SATISFACTORY STANDING, WHO HAVE IN ADDITION ONE AND ONE-HALF YEARS OF PRE-PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCE CREDIT OF WHICH NOT MORE THAN ONE-HALF YEAR OF CREDIT MAY BE ON THE SUB-PROFESSIONAL LEVEL, AS DEFINED IN SECTION R4-30-03, WHOSE APPLICATION IS ENDORSED BY A REGISTERED LANDSCAPE ARCHITECT WHO IS HIS CURRENT OR FORMER EMPLOYER.

THE BOARD WILL GRANT REGISTRATION TO PRACTICE AND ISSUE NUMBERED CERTIFICATES TO THOSE APPLICANTS WHO SUCCESSFULLY COMPLETE THE EXAMINATION STANDARDS OF THE BOARD, AND APPLICANTS WHO HOLD REGISTRATION CERTIFICATES IN OTHER STATES, WHO HAVE MET THE EXAMINATION STANDARDS OF ARIZONA IN THE STATE OF THEIR BASE REGISTRATION, AND ARE IN GOOD STANDING, WILL BE REGISTERED WITHOUT FURTHER EXAMINATION.

AND THE PART IV EXAMINATION PREPARED BY THE BOARD TITLED:

LEGAL PRINCIPLES OF LAND SURVEYING - 4 HOURS

  EXPERIENCE IN RESPONSIBLE CHARGE OF LAND SURVEYING BOUNDARY,
  SUB-DIVISION AND BOUNDARY RETRACEMENT SURVEYS AS DEFINED IN
  RULE R4-30-03.

#### a) REFERENCES

ALL APPLICANTS FOR REGISTRATION TO PRACTICE ARE REQUIRED TO FURNISH NAMES, ADDRESSES, AND POSITION OF FIVE REFERENCES, OF WHICH THREE SHOULD BE REGISTRANTS IN THE CLASSIFICATION FOR WHICH THE APPLICATION IS MADE, AND TWO WHO ARE, OR HAVE BEEN IMMEDIATE SUPERVISORS, WHO NEED NOT BE RESIDENTS OF ARIZONA, BUT MUST BE PERSONS WHOSE FITNESS TO JUDGE YOUR QUALIFICATIONS CAN BE ESTABLISHED BY THE BOARD.

b) REGISTRATION WITHOUT EXAMINATION

  - a. EXTENSIVE AND DIRECT INVOLVEMENT IN WORK IN WHICH A KNOWLEDGE OF THE MATHEMATICAL AND NATURAL SCIENCES GAINED BY STUDY, EXPERIENCE AND PRACTICE IS APPLIED WITH JUDGEMENT TO DEVELOP WAYS TO UTILIZE ECONOMICALLY THE MATERIALS AND FORCES OF NATURE FOR THE BENEFIT OF MANKIND. THIS IMPLIES

PERSONAL DECISIONS ON IMPORTANT TECHNICAL PROBLEMS BASED ON ACTUAL ANALYSIS AND DESIGN CONSIDERATIONS.

- b. CLEAR EVIDENCE OF NOTEWORTHY PERSONAL CONTRIBUTIONS TO IMPORTANT WORK IN THE APPLICANTS FIELD.
- c. PROGRESSIVELY INCREASED RESPONSIBILITY LEADING TO DIRECTION OF OUTSTANDING PROFESSIONAL WORK, RECOGNIZED BY COLLEAGUES, INCLUDING A DIVERSIFIED GROUP OF REGISTERED PROFESSIONAL PEERS BEYOND THE RANGE OF HIS IMMEDIATE ASSOCIATES. WHILE MINIMUM LENGTH OF PRACTICE IS SPECIFIED, LONGEVITY IN ITSELF OR THE COMPETENT PERFORMANCE OF WORK IN ROUTINE OR REPETITIVE TYPE OF ASSIGNMENTS, SHALL NOT ALONE BE SUFFICIENT FOR THE PURPOSES OF THIS PROVISION.
- 2. HE SHALL HAVE A RECORD OF NOT LESS THAN TWENTY-FIVE YEARS OF PROFESSIONAL PRACTICE, OF WHICH AT LEAST TEN YEARS HAVE BEEN IN RESPONSIBLE CHARGE OF OUTSTANDING WORK IN THE DISCIPLINE APPLIED FOR.
- 3. HE SHALL HAVE A FORMAL EDUCATIONAL BACKGROUND OF FOUR YEARS OR MORE AT THE UNIVERSITY LEVEL.
- 4. HE SHALL SUBMIT EXHIBITS INDICATING LENGTH AND CHARACTER OF EXPERIENCE AND PRESENT SELECTED EXHIBITS OF OUTSTANDING ACCOMPLISHMENTS IN HIS FIELD TO A REVIEW COMMITTEE OF THE BOARD.
- Part 10. Repeal Section R4-30-16 Comprehensive Oral Examination, in its entirety.
- Part 11. Amend Section R4-30-17 to read as follows, and add new Paragraph D.

#### R4-30-17 Personal Audience

- A. A personal audience will be required of all applicants in order to complete professional registration. The personal audience will consist of an-oral-and/or a written examination AND REVIEW OF 30 minutes duration and-will-include-questions covering the Code and Rules of the State Board of Technical Registration. #### AN ACT

RELATING TO PROFESSIONS AND OCCUPATIONS; PRESCRIBING DEFINITIONS OF LAND SURVEYOR, LAND SURVEYOR-IN-TRAINING AND PRACTICE OF LAND SURVEYING; PRESCRIBING QUALIFICATIONS OF APPLICANTS; PRESCRIBING CONDITIONS FOR ENGINEERS TO REGISTER AS LAND SURVEYORS, AND AMENDING SECTIONS 32-101 AND 32-122, ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Arizona:

Section 1. Section 32-101, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to read:

32-101. Purpose: definitions

32-101. Purpose; definitions

A. The purpose of this chapter is to provide for the safety, health and welfare of the public through the promulgation and enforcement of standards of qualification for those individuals licensed and seeking licenses pursuant to this chapter.

B. In this chapter, unless the context otherwise requires:

1. "Architect" means a person who, by reason of his knowledge of the mathematical and physical sciences, and the principles of architecture and architectural engineering acquired by professional education and practical experience, is qualified to engage in the practice of architecture as attested by his registration as an architect.

2. "Architect-in-training" means a candidate for registration as a professional architect who is a graduate of a school approved by the board as of satisfactory standing or who has experience as outlined in the current standards of the national council of architectural registration boards in architectural work of a character satisfactory to the board. In addition, the candidate shall have successfully passed the examination in the basic architectural subjects. Upon completion of the requisite years

of training and experience in the field of architecture under the supervision of a professional architect satisfactory to the board, the architect-in-training shall be eligible for the second stage of the prescribed examination for registration as a professional architect.

3. "Architectural practice" means any service or creative work requiring architectural education, training and experience, and the application of the mathematical and physical sciences and the principles of architecture and architectural engineering to such professional services or creative work as consultation, evaluation, design and review of construction for conformance with contract documents and design, in connection with any building, planning or site development. A person shall be deemed to practice or offer to practice architecture who in any manner represents himself to be an architect, or holds himself out as able to perform any architectural service or other services recognized by educational authorities as architecture.

4. "Assayer" means a person who analyzes metals, ores, minerals, or alloys in order to ascertain the quantity of gold or silver or any other

substance present in them.

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5. "Board" means the state board of technical registration.
6. "Engineer" means a professional engineer who, by reason of special knowledge of the mathematical and physical sciences and the principles and methods of engineering analysis and design, acquired by professional education and practical experience, is qualified to practice engineering as attested by his registration as a professional engineer.

"Engineering practice" means any professional service or creative work requiring engineering education, training and experience and the application of special knowledge of the mathematical, physical and engineering sciences to such professional services or creative work as consultation, research investigation, evaluation, planning, surveying, design, location, development, and review of construction for conformance with contract documents and design, in connection with any public or private utility, structure, building, machine, equipment, process, work or project. Such services and work include plans and designs relating to the location, development, mining and treatment of ore and other minerals. A person shall be deemed to be practicing or offering to practice engineering if he practices any branch of the profession of engineering, or by verbal claim, sign; advertisement, letterhead, card or any other marmer represents himself to be a professional engineer, or holds himself out as able to perform or does perform any engineering service or other service or recognized by educational authorities as engineering. A person employed on a full-time basis as an engineer by an employer engaged in the business of developing, mining and treating ores and other minerals shall not be deemed to be practicing engineering for the purposes of this chapter if he engages in the practice of engineering exclusively for and as an employee of such employer and does not hold himself out and is not held out as available to perform any engineering services for persons other than his employer. THE PRACTICE OF ENGINEERING SHALL NOT INCLUDE LAND SURVEYING AS DEFINED IN THIS ACT.

8. "Engineer-in-training" means a candidate for registration as a professional engineer who is a graduate in an approved engineering

curriculum of four years or more of a school approved by the board as of satisfactory standing, or who has had four years or more of experience in engineering work of a character satisfactory to the board, and, in addition, has successfully passed the examination in the basic engineering subjects, and who, upon completion of the requisite years of training and experience in engineering under the supervision of a professional engineer satisfactory to the board, is eligible for the second stage of the prescribed examination for registration as a professional engineer.

9. "Geological practice" means any professional service or work requiring geological education, training,—and experience, and the application of special knowledge of the earth sciences to such professional services as consultation, evaluation of mining properties, petroleum properties,—and ground water GROUNDWATER resources, professional supervision of exploration for mineral natural resources including metallic and nonmetallic ores, petroleum,—and ground water GROUNDWATER, and the geological phases of engineering investigations.

10. "Geologist" means a person, not of necessity an engineer, who by reason of his special knowledge of the earth sciences and the principles and methods of search for and appraisal of mineral or other natural resources acquired by professional education and practical experience is qualified to practice geology as attested by his registration as a professional geologist. A person employed on a full-time basis as a geologist by an employer engaged in the business of developing, mining or treating ores and other minerals shall not be deemed to be engaged in "geological practice" for the purposes of this chapter if he engages in geological practice exclusively for and as an employee of such employer and does not hold himself out and is not held out as available to perform any geological services for persons other than his employer.

Il. "Geologist-in-training" means a candidate for registration as a professional geologist who is a graduate of a school approved by the board as of satisfactory standing or who has had four years or more of experience in geological work of a character satisfactory to the board. In addition, the candidate shall have successfully passed the examination in the basic geology subjects. Upon completion of the requisite years of training and experience in the field of geology under the supervision of a professional geologist satisfactory to the board, the geologist-in-training shall be

eligible for the second stage of the prescribed examination for registration as a professional geologist.

12. "Landscape architect" means a person who, by reason of his professional education, practical experience, or both, is qualified to engage in the practice of landscape architecture as attested by his registration as a landscape architect.

13. 'Landscape architect-in-training' means a candidate for registration as a professional landscape architect who is a graduate of a school approved by the board as of satisfactory standing or who has had four years or more of experience in landscape architectural work of a character satisfactory to the board. In addition, the candidate shall have successfully passed the examination in the basic landscape architectural

subjects. Upon completion of the requisite years of training and experience in the field of landscape architecture under the supervision of a professional landscape architect satisfactory to the board, the landscape architect-in-training shall be eligible for the second stage of the prescribed examination for registration as a professional landscape architect.

"Landscape architectural practice" means the performance of 14. professional services such as consultations, investigation, recommaissance, research, planning, design, or responsible supervision in connection with the development of land and incidental water areas where, and to the extent that the dominant purpose of such services is the preservation, enhancement or determination of proper land uses, natural land features, ground cover and planting, naturalistic and esthetic values, the settings and approaches to buildings, structures, facilities, or other improvements, natural drainage and the consideration and the determination of inherent problems of the land relating to erosion, wear and tear, light or other hazards. This practice shall include the location and arrangement of such tangible objects and features as are incidental and necessary to the purposes outlined in this paragraph, but shall not include the making of cadastral surveys or final land plats for official recording or approval, nor mandatorially include planning for governmental subdivisions.

15. "Land surveyor" means a person who engages in the practice of surveying tracts of land for the determination of their correct locations, areas, boundaries, and description, for the purpose of conveyancing and recording, or for establishment of re-establishment of boundaries and plotting of lands and subdivisions IS A SPECIALIST IN THE TECHNIQUE OF MEASURING LAND, EDUCATED IN THE PRINCIPLES OF MATHEMATICS AND THE RELATED SCIENCES, EXPERIENCED IN THE APPLICATIONS OF THE PRINCIPLES OF MATHEMATICS AND THE RELATED SCIENCES, UNDERSTANDS THE RELEVANT REQUIREMENTS OF LAW FOR THE PRESENTATION OF ADEQUATE EVIDENCE RELATING TO PROPERTY DESCRIPTIONS AND THE SURVEYING OF REAL PROPERTY, ENGAGED IN THE PRACTICE OF LAND SURVEYING AND WHO HOLDS A VALID CERTIFICATE TO PRACTICE LAND SURVEYING IN THIS STATE.

16. "LAND SURVEYOR-IN-TRAINING" MEANS A CANDIDATE FOR REGISTRATION AS A PROFESSIONAL LAND SURVEYOR WHO IS A GRADUATE OF A SCHOOL APPROVED BY THE BOARD, OR WHO HAS HAD FOUR YEARS OR MORE OF EXPERIENCE IN LAND SURVEYING WORK OF A CHARACTER SATISFACTORY TO THE BOARD. IN ADDITION, THE CANDIDATE MUST SUCCESSFULLY PASS THE TWO PART EXAMINATION IN THE BASIC LAND SURVEYING TECHNIQUES. UPON COMPLETION OF THE REQUISITE YEARS OF TRAINING AND EXPERIENCE IN THE FIELD OF LAND SURVEYING, UNDER THE SUPERVISION OF A REGISTRANT OR A QUALIFIED EXEMPTED PERSON WHO IS SATISFACTORY TO THE BOARD, THE LAND SURVEYOR-IN-TRAINING IS ELIGIBLE FOR THE SECOND STAGE OF THE PRESCRIBED EXAMINATION FOR REGISTRATION AS A PROFESSIONAL LAND SURVEYOR.

17. "PRACTICE OF LAND SURVEYING" MEANS THE PERFORMANCE OF PROFESSIONAL WORK AND SERVICES SUCH AS CONSULTATION, RESEARCH, LAND PLANNING, PREPARATION OF DRAWINGS, AND LAND DESCRIPTIONS, IN CONNECTION WITH THE USE AND DEVELOPMENT OF LAND.

ADDITIONALLY, THE PRACTICE OF LAND SURVEYING INCLUDES THE ACT OF MEASURING, LOCATING, ESTABLISHING OR RE-ESTABLISHING CORNERS, LINES, BOUNDARIES, ANGLES, ELEVATIONS, CONTOURS AND NATURAL AND MAN-MADE FEATURES IN THE AIR, ON THE SURFACE OF THE EARTH, WITHIN UNDERGROUND WORKINGS AND ON THE BEDS OF BODIES OF WATER FOR THE PURPOSE OF MONUMENTING OR RE-MONUMENTING LAND BOUNDARIES AND FOR THE PRELIMINARY AND FINAL FLATTING OF LAND SUBDIVISIONS INCLUDING TOPOGRAPHY AND THE PREPARATION AND PERPETUATION OF MAPS, PLATS, FIELD NOTE RECORDS AND LAND DESCRIPTIONS THAT REPRESENT SUCH SERVICE OR WORK. THE PRACTICE OF LAND SURVEYING POES NOT INCLUDE THE DESIGN, EITHER IN WHOLE OR IN PART, OF ANY STRUCTURE OR FIXED WORKS EMBRACED IN THE PRACTICE OF PROFESSIONAL ENGINEERING. THIS PARAGRAPH SHALL NOT BE CONSTRUED TO PROHIBIT A LICENSED ENGINEER ARCHITECT OR LANDSCAPE ARCHITECT FROM DOING ANY WORK INCLUDED IN HIS RESPECTIVE PRACTICE IF SUCH WORK DOES NOT INVOLVE THE ESTABLISHMENT OR RE-ESTABLISHMENT OF PROPERTY CORNERS OR PROPERTY LINES OR THE WRITING OF LAND DESCRIPTIONS.

Sec. 2. Section 32-122, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to read:

32-122. Qualifications of applicant

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A. An applicant for registration as an architect, engineer, geologist, or landscape architect OR LAND SURVEYOR shall be of good moral character and repute,— and shall have engaged actively for at least eight years in architectural, engineering, geological, or landscape architectural OR LAND SURVEYING education and experience which meets standards specified by the board in its rules and regulations, but each year of teaching architectural, engineering, geological, or landscape architectural OR LAND SURVEYING subjects or of study satisfactorily completed in an architectural, engineering, geological, or landscape architectural OR LAND SURVEYING school approved by the board up to a maximum of five years may be considered equivalent to one year of active engagement.

B. An applicant for registration as an assayer or a land surveyor shall be of good moral character and repute and shall have engaged actively for at least six years in assaying or land surveying education and experience which meets standards specified by the board in its rules and regulations, but each year of teaching assaying or land surveying or of study satisfactorily completed in a school approved by the board, up to a maximum of four years, may be considered equivalent to one year of active engagement.

Sec. 3. Current registrants

A. ANY REGISTERED PROFESSIONAL ENGINEER OR AN ENGINEER EXEMPT UNDER SECTION 32-144, ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES, WHO HAS ACTIVELY PRACTICED LAND SURVEYING AS DEFINED IN SECTION 32-101, ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES, MAY, WITHIN SIX MONTHS OF THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ACT, APPLY TO THE BOARD FOR EXAMINATION TO PRACTICE WITHIN THE DISCIPLINE OF LAND SURVEYING. THE BOARD SHALL DETERMINE, UNDER ITS RULES, THE QUALIFICATIONS OF THE APPLICANT AND THOSE PORTIONS OF THE EXAMINATION THE APPLICANT MUST COMPLETE, IF ANY. WITHIN EIGHTEEN MONTHS OF THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ACT, AN APPLICANT MUST SUCCESSFULLY COMPLETE ALL STATUTORY AND BOARD IMPOSED REQUIREMENTS.

B. A REGISTRANT WHO IS ALSO AN APPLICANT FOR REGISTRATION AS A LAND SURVEYOR SHALL NOT PRACTICE LAND SURVEYING AS DEFINED IN SECTION 32-101, ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES, BEYOND EIGHTEEN MONTHS FROM THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ACT WITHOUT BEING REGISTERED AS A LAND SURVEYOR.

Sec. 4. INTENT REGARDING TERMINATION

Dear Mr. Chairman,

Upon request from the State Board of Technical Registration, the Arizona Chapter of the American Society of Landscape Architects as representatives of the registered landscape architects in Arizona, respectfully present our recommendations for additional exemptions and limitations in regard to the issue of landscape contractors engaging in design work.

Consistant with our views expressed in the recent Sunset Legislation Review Process, the landscape architects of Arizona have no desire to limit competition in the field of landscape design. However, we do seek to clarify and define the areas which directly involve the public health, safety, and welfare and therefore require registration. Persuant to that goal, we present the following:

#### 32-144 Exemptions and Limitations

- A-3 Add the words "or site development plans" so as to read:
  - ...or who design a single family dwelling or addition or alterations or site development plans to such dwelling.
- A-6 (New Exemption) A contractor licensed persuant to Classifications A-21, C-26, C-44, who provides their own drawings for their own construction activities provided that the drawings do not involve the use of public lands or public rights of way, whether dedicated or to be dedicated, through the development process, which involve issues of public health, safety, and welfare and further the drawings do not involve major site grading, site drainage, site structures, or site circulation patterns which are used by the public.

Dear Mr. Edson,

I wish to file a formal complaint against Brian Spencer, architect on charges of gross negligence and incompetence. The following will outline incidents to support this charge.

My first contact with Mr. Spencer was February 1, 1980. I was seeking an architect to design an energy efficent home which incorporated passive solar heating. Schoenberger Architects had been recommended to me for such a project. When I reached Schoenberger's firm Mr. Spencer was who I talked to. After describing the project to him we agreed to meet the following day, February 2, 1980 at my home for further discussions. I requested plans for a home that was to cost approximately \$50,000 to build and contain about 1800 sq. ft. Further, the design was to be simple enough to accommodate my inexperience in construction and permit parts to be built myself. He agreed to take the project for a fee of \$3,000. While this figure is lower than current standards, he planned to work out side his office on his own time. We signed a formal contract on February 20, 1980, at which time he presented me with very rough sketches of his ideas. (A \$300 retainer was paid at that time.)

At the time of signing the contract, I explained to him that I wanted all working drawings ready by June 1, 1980 so that I may begin construction then. Meeting this deadline was heavily stressed. I am a school teacher and planned to subcontract most of the work during my free summer. Mr. Spencer indicated that the deadline would be no difficulty.

During the months of constructing plans, Mr. Spencer was less than reliable and dependable. Of the ten appointments scheduled after the contract was signed, Mr. Spencer kept only six on the scheduled date. Three appointments were not kept at all, with no notice of cancellation. Further, Mr. Spencer rarely arrived on time. He was generally at least an hour late.

Most of the appointments were initiated by myself when I was able to reach him. I frequently left messages at his office and home with perhaps only 50% response. On at least two occassions, when attempts were made to contact him at his office, they had no idea of his wherabouts. The response made by his office indicated they also may have found him unreliable.

The point of total frustration began with a scheduled appointment of August 10, 1980 at 10:00 A.M. At 11:30 A.M. Mr. Spencer called and rescheduled for 7:30 P.M. Mr. Spencer never arrived and has not been heard from since. Just prior to the meeting I informed him that I now was financially ready to begin construction and thus needed all completed working plans. He claimed they were ready. On August 20, 1980 a partial set of plans were sent to my home by messenger. I have tried repeatedly since August 10 to reach Mr. Spencer and left

many messages but all have been ignored.

Perhaps the most glaring instance of technical incompetence of Mr. Spencer's lay in the basic design of the house. His assignment was to deploy a passive system for heating the home. We decided jointly to use a modified tromble wall. He designed one that was four feet high and about fifteen feet long. It was placed ten feet from the light emitting window. When I questioned him about its placement, he assured me it would function fine at that distance. I recently examined it more closely. When protracting the angle at which the lowest noon sun in the winter would strike the wall I discovered the sun would have to be 22°. According to tables on page 214 of Sun Farth by Richard L. Crowther, the December 21 sun is only 33° at noon. The conclusion is that the sun would only strike the wall at early morning and late afternoon, times when it would have little effect.

On July 7, 1980 I requested from Mr. Spencer feeting and foundation plans with topicgraphical elevations shown. I decided it would be wise to start taking excavation bids. I was given the plans a week later and began taking bids. The excavating contractors all but laughed at me due to the inaccuracy and incompleteness of the elevations. Accuracy of elevations was critical for the Fountain Hills lot as it has many contours.

For all home construction in Fountain Hills the plans must be approved by the Architecture Committee. Mr. Spencer scheduled an appointment for me to go before the committee on July 24, 1980. The secretary had outlined to him all the requirements before approval could be granted. They informed him he must have the following in addition to a full set of plans:

- 1. Color scheme of the house exterior.
- 2. Solar collector placement.
- 3. Total area of house.
- 4. Window frame materials.
- 5. Finished grade lines.
- 6. Paving materials.
- 7. A letter of intent for landscaping.
- 8. Plans were to be submitted a day prior to the committee meeting.

Mr. Spencer furnished none of these. Consequently I received only a conditional approval by his lack of proper preparation.


At a July meeting with Mr. Spencer we discussed design changes on the floor plans. Not being pleased with several features I outlined seven areas I wanted changed. Later plans revealed a disregard for five of these requests. Due to his lack of communication I was never able to discuss this with him.

In conclusion, I have given up all hopes to even start construction before next summer due to Mr. Spencers failures. I currently do not have workable plans to build with even if time were not a factor. He has cost me money not only for unusable plans that do not meet my origional specifications but in increased construction costs caused by inflation for a later construction date.

I request the board to give fair analysis to my problem and provide a just resolution. I have absolutely no desire for Mr. Spencer to continue. I have lost all faith and confidence in his abilities.

- D. The office has received other leads on enforcement matters (twenty or thirty) which are still unsubstantiated. In addition, windshield yellow page surveys must be completed for assayers, geologists, landscape architects and land surveyors in Phoenix (Maricopa County) and for all the disciplines in Pima County, Santa Cruz County, Yuma County, Coconino County, and Yavapai County, and eventually in all fourteen counties.

## 3. COMPLAINTS FOR EVALUATION

# A. C79-021 - BTR vs. Willdan Associates

Contractor James Page filed a complaint alleging Willdan Associates was negligent in the provision of engineering and land surveying services for the Hacienda del Rey Subdivision, Scottsdale, Arizona.

The Committee reviewed the file, including an investigation report, a rebuttal from Willdan Associates and court records.

The Committee found possible errors of commission and omission on the part of Willdan Associates and recommends to the board:

- 1. That the parties be scheduled for an informal hearing at the next meeting of the Enforcement Committee to verify certain aspects of the record.
  - 2. That the Executive Director contact the professional societies regarding names of individuals who may be willing to serve as expert witnesses in enforcement proceedings.

# B. C79-032 - BTR vs. Environmental Repair Service

Landscape Architect, Norman Aubuchon, filed a complaint through Attorney Rodney Matheson, alleging Environmental Repair Service practices landscape architecture as non-registrants and are in violation of A.R.S. 32-121 and further defined under A.R.S. 32-145.

The Committee reviewed the complaint, a rebuttal from Environmental Repair Service and the investigative report and found substantial evidence of violation in accordance with the complaint and that William H. Hulse, Arizona Registered Architect No. 10861, as a participant in this business, may be in violation of A.R.S.32-128.

The Committee recommends to the board:

- 1. That the Executive Director consult with the Attorney General regarding procedure for filing a complaint against Environmental Repair Service through the office of the Maricopa County Attorney for violation of A.R.S. 32-121 as defined under A.R.S. 32-101 and 32-145.
- 2. That Mr. Cox and Mr. Hulse be scheduled for an informal hearing at the next meeting of the Enforcement Committee to clarify Mr. Hulse's relationship to the Environmental Repair Service enterprise and to discuss possible violations of the Environmental Repair Service's operation.
- C. C80-35 BTR vs. Charles H. Woodworth (Arizona Structural Engineer #4724)

The City of Phoenix Building Safety Department called our attention to substandard structural work sealed by Mr. Woodworth in a project done with Hurst Drafting Service.

The Committee reviewed the investigative report and the drawing exhibits and found that Mr. Woodworth's exhibits a lack of structural expertise common to the structural engineering profession and may be guilty of incompetence under A.R.S. 32-128 and that Mr. Woodworth may be guilty of aiding and abetting non-registrant, Hurst, in evading the provisions of the statutes regulating the practice of architecture, under A.R.S. 32-128 and that Hurst Drafting Service is not registered to practice architecture as required by A.R.S. 32-121 and that Hurst is not exempt under A.R.S. 32-144.

The Committee therefore recommends to the board

- 1. That Mr. Charles Woodworth be scheduled for an informal hearing at the next meeting of the Enforcement Committee to further verify testimony given to an investigator of the board, which may bear on a recommendation to schedule a formal revocation.
- 2. That the Executive Director consult with the Attorney General regarding procedure for filing a complaint against Hurst Drafting Service through the office of the Maricopa County Attorney regarding violation of A.R.S. 32-121, as further defined by A.R.S. 32-101 and A.R.S. 32-145, and that Mr. Hurst be scheduled for an informal hearing at the next meeting of the Committee.
- D. <u>C80-36 BTR vs. Logan E. Campbell, Arizona Reg. Architect #2728</u>

  City of Phoenix Building Safety Department called our attention to a print of a substandard drawing of a building on which the seal of Logan E. Campbell was applied and signed.

The Committee reviewed the investigative report and the drawing exhibits and found that the unprofessional character of the drawing

and the lack of professional expertise shown thereby could not be the work of a professional registered architect and that Mr. Campbell's seal was applied to a print of the drawing done by non-registrant Stienke, and that Mr. Campbell may be guilty of sealing work not prepared by himself in violation of A.R.S.32-125 and of aiding and abetting a non-registrant by allowing his registration to be used by a non-registrant in violation of A.R.S. 32-128.

Therefore, the committee recommends to the board:

- That Mr. Campbell be scheduled for an informal hearing at the next meeting of the Enforcement Committee to further explain his action in sealing the work of a non-registrant, Stienke, which may bear on a recommendation to schedule a formal revocation hearing.
- 2. That the Executive Director further investigate the role of Fred Miller, Arizona Structural Engineer #4945, in assisting non-registrant, Stienke, to get a building permit on substandard work.
- 3. That the Executive Director discuss further moves on non-registrant, Stienke, with the Assistant Attorney General in view of the fact that he appears to be exempt from requirements of registration under A.R.S. 32-144.

# E. C80-037 - BTR vs Diversified Drafting Service

Anonymous communication forwarded advertising material published by this firm. No registrants were identified.

The Committee reviewed correspondence in the file and an investigative report, and found that with recent advertising involving Arizona Registrant, David M. Niese, C.E. #8081, the firm may be guilty of misleading the public concerning the qualifications of the non-registrant firm by displaying the name of a registrant who is not a member of the firm and that Mr. Niese may be guilty of aiding and abetting non-registrants to evade the requirements of registration to practice in violation of A.R.S. 32-128.

Therefore, the Committee recommends to the board that:

- Mr. Niese be scheduled for an informal hearing at the next meeting of the Enforcement Committee to verify his activities in connection with the defendant firm.
- 2. Following that clarification, the defendant firm be requested to stop advertising services for which they are not qualified and to sign an affidavit certifying compliance.

F. C80-038 - BTR vs. Milford K. Peterson, Arizona Civil Engineer, #11427 and Land Surveyor, #4529.

Mrs. Frieda White filed a complaint alleging Peterson was guilty of misconduct in the practice of his profession in that a survey done by Peterson for her neighbor drastically affected her property lines in effect for thirty-one years.

The case was reviewed by the board's advisory panel in land surveying, who indicate from the evidence submitted that Peterson's survey procedure in using an accepted corner in lieu of the monumented corner was correct, and that the complaint has no basis in questioning the competence of Mr. Peterson.

The Committee reviewed the file and the evidence submitted and took no exception to the recommendations of the panel of experts.

Therefore, the Committee recommends to the board:

- 1. That the file be closed and the parties notified of the findings.
- That Ms. White additionally be advised to seek independent legal advice concerning her rights with respect to the contested property line.

#### 3. MEETING DATE

The next meeting was tentatively scheduled for August 5, 1980, pending confirmation.

#### 4. ADJOURNMENT

#### PHOENIX ENFORCEMENT COMMITTEE

Arizona State Board of Technical Registration

A meeting of the Board's Phoenix Enforcement Committee was held at 9:00 A.M., August 5, 1980, at the office of the Board, 1645 W. Jefferson, Phoenix, Arizona.

# 1. CALL TO ORDER

Present: Rod J. Gomez, Chairman

Jimmie R. Nunn William S. Gookin Wayne O. Earley John B. Riggs

The meeting was called to order by Rod J. Gomez, Chairman.

### 2. READING OF MINUTES:

The minutes of the Enforcement Committee Meeting of July 8, 1980 were approved as mailed.

# 3. COMPLAINTS:

- A. C79-021 BTR vs. Willdan Associates.
  This was the time and place to conduct an informed hearing with the parties. Mr. Dale Carter, representing Willdan Associates was unable to appear and sent prior communication requesting continuance. The Committee deferred action until the next scheduled meeting, to hear the parties prior to forwarding a recommendation.
- B. C79-032 BTR vs. Environmental Repair Service
  In accordance with Committee action at their July 8 meeting, the
  Committee met informally with Mr. Rod Cox (non-Registrant) and Mr.
  William H. Hunse (Reg. Architect #10861) of Environmental Repair Service
  to review the complaint and to discuss requirements of the Arizona
  Revised Statutes.

Mr. Cox stated that he was a graduate of A.S.U. in Architecture, that he was a licensed Landscape Contractor and that he used his ability in graphic design to illustrate for his clients the nature of their planting schemes, for which he was contracting, that he felt this was "planting design", that he at no time represented himself as a Landscape Architect, that his business was built on prepared proposals with predictable cost effectiveness, that there was and is, a demand for the design-build landscape environment, and that Landscape Architects by and large were not interested in filling the gap.

Mr. Hunse stated that his services to the firm were administrative in nature, that he performed architectural services for his own clientele, and that he was in the process of legally separating his affair from the Environmental Repair Service Company.

The Committee considered the testimony, and the evidence, and concluded that under the provisions of A.R.S. 32-101-14 Mr. Cox was engaging in the practice of Landscape Architect and was in violation of A.R.S. 32-121 in not being registered to practice and was therefore guilty of a misdemeanor under A.R.S. 32-145.

The Committee recommends to the Board that a civil complaint under A.R.S. 32-145 be filed against Environmental Repair Service through the Office of the Maricopa County Attorney.

Regarding Mr. Hunse, the Committee accepted Mr. Hunse's testimony and did not find that he was aiding and abetting non-registrant Cox, and was in the process of clarifying their relationship by disassociating from Environmental Repair Service. The Committee recommends a stern letter be forwarded to Mr. Hunse, asking him to confirm disassociation with Environmental Repair Service, and warn him of the consequences of aiding and abetting non-registrants.

The parties were informed of the recommendations.

C. C80-35 BTR vs. Charles H. Woodworth (Arizona Structural Engineer #4724).

In accord with Committee action at their July 8, 1980 meeting, the Committee met informally with Mr. Charles Woodworth, and Mr. Donald Hurst DBA Hurst Drafting Service to review the complaint and discuss requirements of the Arizona Revised Statues.

Mr. Woodworth verified his relationship with Mr. Hurst, that he was employed by Hurst to consult in the structure of the subject project and that the seal and signature shown by the drawings was his. He provided Engineering Calculations for Committee review.

Mr. Hurst stated that he was hired to provide drawings by the Wade & Kravitz Company, that he prepared the drawings (under the direction of Mr. Woodworth) that he secured the services of Mr. Woodworth and a Mr. Bill Krok and K & H Electric Co. to assist with mechanical and electrical design, that he was paid for his services by Wade & Kravitz.

After review of the testimony and the evidence, the Committee found
1. That under A.R.S. 32-128A - Mr. Woodworth demonstrated a lack of structural expertise common to the structural engineering profession, and is therefore guilty of a degree of incompetence and that he was guilty of aiding and abetting a non-registrant to evade the provisions of the statute.

The Committee recommends to the Board that proceedings be implemented to revoke Mr. Woodworth's licence to practice Structural Engineering.

2. That under the provisions of A.R.S. 32-101-B Mr. Hurst was engaging in the practice of Architecture and was in violation of A.R.S. 32-121 in not being registered to practice, nor was he exempt under A.R.S. 32-144, and was therefore guilty of a misdemeanor under A.R.S. 32-145.

The Committee recommends to the Board that a civil complaint under A.R.S. 32-145 be filed against Donald Hurst DBA Hurst Drafting Service through the Office of the Maricopa County Attorney.

- D. C80-36 BTR vs. Logan E. Campbell, Ariz. Reg. Architect #2728

  This was the time and place to conduct an informal hearing with the party. Mr. Campbell was unable to appear and sent prior communication requesting the matter be continued. The Committee deferred action until the next scheduled meeting.
- E. C80-037 BTR vs. Diversified Drafting Service
  In accord with Committee recommendations at the July 8, 1980 meeting, the Committee met informally with Mr. David M. Niese, Civil Engineer #8081, and with Mr. Kenneth Miller and Mr. Clay Chiapini of Diversified Drafting Service.

Mr. Niese testified that he was not associated with Diversified Drafting Service, but at one time had considered it, and that he had performed consulting services for Diversified Drafting Service on projects contracted by Diversified Drafting Service, and he was paid by Diversified Drafting Service for his services. He mentioned an "apartment house", being one of the projects, and a Mr. Ron Weber being the Architect. Niese stated he was presently employed by Maricopa County as a Soil Engineer, had recognized the legal pitfalls of association with Diversified Drafting Service, and felt he was conducting his affairs in a professional manner.

The Committee heard testimony from Mr. Kenneth Miller and Mr. Clay Chiapini. Mr. Miller represented Hair Center's, Inc. and stated they were the owner's of the Diversified Drafting Service, and that Mr. Chiapini was at the moment, the sole employee, that the business was incorporated to produce house plans and other miscellaneous drafting services, that the material on which the complaint was based was premature prepared by a sales person and should not have been distributed. He indicated Ron Weber, who is an Architect, was originally involved with the company, as well as Mr. Niese, but not as principals of the company.

After consideration of the testimony and the evidence in the file the Committee found

- 1) That Mr. Niese did perfom some services for Diversified Drafting Service, that he had recognized the impropriety of continuing the relationship, and had discontinued the association.
- 2) That the business practices conducted by Diversified Drafting Services were not clearly exempt under A.R.S. 32-144, that there was no current evidence in the file of violation of A.R.S. 32-121, as defined under 32-101 for the practice of architecture, but that without recognition of the law, and a change in business practice, Diversified Drafting Service could be offering services in violation of the statutes.

Therefore, the Committee recommends to the Board:

- That a letter and affidavit be sent to Mr. Niese, emphasizing the penalties prescribed by A.R.S. 32-128, for his acknowledgement and return.
- 2) That a consent agreement outlining the limits of exempt service under the law be drawn up and offered for acceptance to Diversified Drafting Service.
- 3) That the circumstances of Mr. Ron Weber's association with

Diversified Drafting Service be further investigated and reported back to the Committee.

4) That a notice go to the professional societies concerning the use of drafting services by registrants, and possible violation of statute that may occur in these arrangements.

#### 4. OTHER BUSINESS

- A. News article A.S.U. Physical Facilities Dept. The Executive Director was instructed to send a letter to A.S.U. officials at the highest level, commenting on the article and calling their attention to the Arizona Revised Statutes.
- B. That a rule be considered defining supervision of an employee.
- C. That an opinion be sought from Attorney General concerning a definition of "Public Work".

# REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

## STAFF:

Virginia Noffsinger resigned late in July, effective on August 8. Patricia Wood came on board to replace her on August 18 and comes to us from the Executive Budget Office. She has good experience in processing paper with various state agencies, and the transition is going smoothly. To assist in cleaning up backlog caused by the gap in filling the position, we have brought in a temporary Secretary II.

We received an excellent list of applicants for the new Administrative Assistant II position on August 20 and interviewed nine people on August 27, 28, and 29. Mr. James L. Walter has been appointed and will begin work on Monday, September 8. Mr. Walter has a B.A. degree in Political Science, a B.A. degree in International Management and comes to us with 18 months experience as Assistant to the President of Hawaii Hotel Workers & Teamsters Union and seven years as a Tribunal Administrator, Construction Rules, of the American Arbitration Association here in Phoenix. He has an excellent background in knowledge of the design professions, communication skills, and investigation.

### SEMINAR:

I attended the Management Seminar authorized by the Board at the June meeting and thought it was an excellent and well-worthwhile experience. I have already used material from the seminar in picking winners from an interview list and in implementing our office Performance, Planning & Evaluation Reports (management by objective).

We have sent monthly reports to you of the disciplinary actions taken by New York State during the past year in the professions with which you are concerned. So far as I know we are the only State to provide such a service. We believe that even this limited service is valuable to other states as it allows them to take disciplinary actions against individuals disciplined by New York State who are also licensed in your state. As many of you know, we also send out copies of the charges and findings and recommendations of the professional boards and the Board of Regents as well as a written transcript of the proceedings and appendices without charge, upon request.

We believe that this system would be more effective if all states prepared such reports and made this type of information available. To perform this function, it would probably be necessary to create a central clearinghouse as New York State is not prepared to undertake such a role unilaterally at this time.

However, I believe that there are several things you could do which would be extremely helpful. One would be to send my agency similar reports of disciplinary actions taken by boards which are under Your jurisdiction, as well as additional material if it was determined that the subject of such action was licensed in New York State. Second, I would appreciate any comments you might have on this idea or on our efforts thus far. Third, I would find it particularly helpful if you would complete the attached questionnaire and return it to me in the attached envelope as soon as possible, as I believe that now is the time to push for private or public support for this important project.

## DATE OF ADMINISTRATION

The National Council of Engineering Examiners has announced Saturday, November 1, 1980 as the administration date for the Fundamentals of Engineering Examination. The alternate dates are Thursday, October 30 and Friday, October 31. The Fundamentals of Engineering Examination may be administered within a given Board's jurisdiction on Thursday, Friday, or Saturday, but on only one of these dates.

#### CHANGES FOR THIS ADMINISTRATION

In accordance with the decisions of the NCEE Uniform Examinations and Qualifications Committee and the NCEE Board of Directors, and as announced by NCEE in various publications during the past year, the following changes take effect with the October 1980 administration:

- 1. Each Board will receive one copy of a roster in ascending Examinee Identification Number order. The descending total score roster, frequency distribution and the extra copies have been eliminated to save money and reduce the bulk of information the Boards have to handle and file.
- 2. The Fundamentals of Engineering Examination is considered and referred to as one eight-hour examination with no distinction between morning and afternoon 'portions. Only one score, the total of the AM and PM portions, shall be reported to Member Boards. No score will be reported unless both portions of the test are taken.
- 3. Although there will be no change in the total converted score information that has been reported to you in the past (the same 0 - 100 scale with 70 intended as minimum passing will be used), the converted scores from 0 to 100 will be scaled on the basis of the NCEE recommended minimum passing score. (This will eliminate the additional step which Boards were formerly required to take in order to convert reported scores and which involved using the separate conversion table booklet distributed by the National Council.)

Motion carried.
  - B. MOTION: It was moved by Mr. Gookin and seconded by Dr. O'Bannon that in the registration process, upon receipt of applications, the review thereof be performed by the office staff, and each applicant be advised in writing of the recommendation which the staff will make to the full Board. Such notification should include the 20-question quiz to each applicant with a request that the applicant affirm by signed affidavit that he in fact understands the law. The mailing of this quiz will include out-of-state as well as in-state applicants. Each notification shall advise each applicant that he has a right to an evaluation conference provided such a request is made in writing by the applicant.



#### PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The State Board of Technical Registration, as a regulatory and enforcement agency, registers architects, assayers, engineers, geologists, landscape architects and land surveyors and regulates the performance within these professions through the promulgation and enforcement of standards of qualification and performance.

#### PROGRAM GOAL

To provide for the safety, health and welfare of the public by licensing only those applicants who meet the standards of qualifications and by enforcing the regulations by investigating and resolving complaints against those registered by the Board and against non-registrants.

#### PROGRAM PLANS

To maintain and improve, where necessary, the standards of qualifications for registration in Arizona:

To provide efficient and professional evaluation and examination services.


To investigate all complaints against registrants promptly and thoroughly, to initiate corrective measures to rectify the problems, and to conduct hearings and take disciplinary action as appropriate

To investigate all complaints against non-registrants accused of practicing in professional · fields subject to registration and request the proper law enforcement agencies to prosecute such practices when appropriate.

## PROGRAM RESULTS

Board members and staff evaluated 832 applications for registration and 447 in-training applications. Board members conducted 832 personal interviews with registration applicants upon completion by each of short written examination on registration law and rules of the Board. Staff administered 2821 technical and professional examinations (average length: 4 hours) to . further qualify applicants for registration. Board granted 654 new professional registrations and 203 new in-training certificates; staff renewed registration certificates for 9124 active registrants.

Staff processed 21 complaints, 9 against registrants, 12 against non-registrants. Board resolved 21 complaints by agreement; 133 complaints currently are in process.


